N3SH Selected as the 2006 PA QSO Party Bonus Station

For the record, WASH is this years SES."

With these words from an April 20th e-mail to me, we were officially (if not yet publicly) notified that the WRELESS ASSOCIATION OF SOUTH HILLS has been selected to host this year's Pa QSO Party Special Event / Bonus Station, under (of course) the N3SH call.

This is a real honor to the club, and a real feather in our cap. Now comes the tough part: living up to it.

Fortunately, the club's activities in the last few years have gotten us well prepared to host the SES. We've run multiple stations in the contest for years, under all three of our club calls, plus many individual or small group efforts from club members. We've operated portables and mobiles. And collectively, we've won our fair share of certificates and accolades.

Our immediate priorities are, of course, Dayton Hamvention, Breezeshooter's Hamfest (and club picnic), the June VHF Contest for some, and Field Day. But that doesn't mean we can't start planning now. October may "only" be 5 months away, but that time will melt like butter if we don't use it wisely.

Nothing is set in stone yet, but here are some of the early ideas that have been tossed around on the air, at the club breakfast, and in private bull sessions:

- Run three primary stations: N3SH/Phone from one county, N3SH/CW from another, N3SH/Digital from a third.
- Run three primary stations, two from our "home" counties of Allegheny and Washington, and the third from the scout camp in Fayette (WA3SH the last few years), with each station running all modes.
- Run three primary stations as above, and several secondary stations from other surrounding WPA counties.
- Run three primaries, multiple secondary ones, and toss in a mobile or two to cover additional counties.
- And while you're at it, see if some of our out-of-state members want to activate their ARRL sections for the contest as N3SH/R too!

Any or all of these combinations are doable, IF we have three things:

- Enough Operators
- Enough Equipment
- Enough Locations



(Oh, and just to be clear: By "Primary" stations, we're talking about stations that will be on the air the entire contest, at least 2 or 3 transmitters at a time, staffed by 10 or so operators. "Secondary" stations will running single transmitter most of the time, with occasionally a second rig or mode running simultaneously, staffed by 2 to 5 ops. We'd really not want to see single op N3SH stations if possible, as we'd like to see each station on the air as much as possible)

And that's the tricky part. You see, to be the Bonus Station, we're committed to having multiple signals on the air — the more bands and modes the better. And the Harrisburg group set a new standard a few years back by running W3UU/R from multiple counties. It's now up to us to meet or even exceed that standard. And we can do it!

So at the May meeting, we're going to spend a few minutes hashing over some of the possibilities and try to select our best options, while maintaining the flexibility to adjust as conditions warrant. If you have some ideas, that will be the best time to come out and toss them into the ring.

Now in the meantime:

- Ted W4ZE has volunteered to host the N3SH Washington effort. Ted is
 planning to operate primarily, if not exclusively, RTTY. (This does bring
 up the question as to whether or not we'd want to run a separate N3SH
 Washington for SSB, CW, and PSK-31.)
- There has been a general assumption that many or most of the WA3SH
 Fayette ops will return, simply running this year as N3SH/R Fayette.
 We'd hate to break up a winning team, but perhaps some of these ops
 will help out at other stations, or perhaps we'll split the group and run
 some of them from another county?
- Who will host the N3SH Allegheny effort?

- What other counties do we want to put a station into? Early candidates appear to be, in no particular order, Greene, Armstrong, Butler, Mercer, and Lawrence. We may already have a QTH for a Butler op. Forest, Clarion and Westmoreland are possibilities too — all places that some of our current or former club members have operated from at one time or another in past years contests.
 - A few people have asked if they can have non-member friends help out. The initial reaction is sure, why not? We do have overlaps with other area clubs (especially WACOM and Steel City), and anything that encourages others to participate is a good thing!
- Each station will run a separate log; we'll merge them for QSL purposes
 after the fact. Trying to network on the fly stations in some of the more
 remote areas of WPA is a technical challenge, and certainly doable, but
 may take more effort for our club than it's worth... this year...
- In addition to QSL's, we can also offer a certificate to stations working
 multiple N3SH locations. For example, if we end up with 7 counties
 active, offer a "basic" certificate for anyone working any 3 counties, a
 "bronze" certificate for working 4, "silver" for 5, "gold" for 6, and
 "platinum" for all 7 and this could be a real challenge if one or two
 stations concentrate on a single mode!
- And if we have enough stations QRV, why not a little competition between ourselves?

These are just a few thoughts based on feedback to date. A gain, nothing's in stone yet, so if you have an idea, now is the time to bring it forward!

Looking forward to another great effort by the club in this year's contest... remember, we won 3 counties multi-op in 2005, let's top that in 2006!

New BPL Complaint arrives as ARRL Nudges FCC to Answer Earlier Filings ARRL Web Extra courtesy of the American Radio Relay League

NEWINGTON, CT, May 5th, 2006 — Another Manassas, Virginia, radio amateur has joined the growing list of those filing formal complaints about disruptive interference from the city's broadband over power line (BPL) system. The May 4th letter from ARRL member Arthur R. Whittum, W1CRO, went to the FCC's Spectrum Enforcement Division just one day before the ARRL again prevailed upon the same office to act on several earlier--and similar--complaints of BPL interference. Whittum reported that BPL interference to his mobile station on April 25 and May 3 made 40-meter SSB operation impossible "during a transit of streets in Manassas" covering about two miles.

"The digital hash from BPL obliterated even strong signals on 7255 kHz to the point of unintelligibility," Whittum wrote the FCC. "Since I couldn't identify who was transmitting or who was net control, I couldn't check into the nets and couldn't even identify whether or not there was any radio message traffic destined for this area."

Whittum said his latest complaint is the third he's attempted to submit. "The first two seem to have gone astray, even though they were introduced in advance by e-mail," he told Spectrum Enforcement Division Chief Joseph Casey. "I hope this one finds its way to you."

On May 5th, the ARRL wrote Casey to ask when the FCC planned to respond to longstanding interference complaints from four other Manassas radio amateurs. The League said it also wants to know when it can expect the FCC to require BPL system operator COMTek, equipment maker Main.net and the City of Manassas "to comply with the

Commission's rules governing radiated emissions and the non-interference requirement of §15.5 of those rules."

On March 7th, Casey called on the city and COMTek to follow up on the January 19th complaint of Dwight Agnew, Al4II, citing harmful BPL interference along Virginia Business Route 234. The Commission instructed the city to conduct measurements to ensure its system complies with FCC Part 15 rules and to "resolve any continuing harmful interference." In another letter the same day, Casey asked George Tarnovsky, K4GVT; Donald Blasdell, W4HJL; William South, N3OH and Jack Cochran, WC4J, to provide additional information regarding their longstanding interference complaints or the FCC would not consider them further. All four provided the requested addenda by early April.

"Since then, no action has been taken by the Spectrum Enforcement Division," the League said in its May 5th letter to Casey. "An investigation of these complaints is now long overdue and amply justified by the responses of Messrs Cochran, Tarnovsky, Blasdell and South to your March 7th, 2006, letter."

On April 6th, COMTek filed a report with the FCC in response to Agnew's interference complaint. The company said it did not believe the Manassas BPL system caused the interference Agnew and other Manassas ham radio operators have heard. Agnew told the ARRL a few days after COMTek's report that the BPL interference continues.

In a consolidated complaint on behalf of Tarnovsky, Blasdell and South filed October 13th, the ARRL asked the FCC to order the BPL system shut down "until the operator can demonstrate compliance with the requirement that it not cause harmful interference to licensed radio services."

Is It Time?

I almost ran this in last month's issue, but between all the great articles we already had, and the fact that it was the April issue...

On the other hand, it has been a long time. And when a noted and respected ham like Martti OH2BH gently chides me about it being more than time to

I've had my call a long time. The piece of paper from the FCC, right down to good old Ben F. Waple's reproduced signature, came in the mail in the summer, shortly after the family moved from NJ to PA in 1973... almost 33 years ago. (No, I haven't joined QCWA yet, don't change the subject!)

Back then, my only hope of a call sign change would have been to upgrade, trading in my "N" for an "A;" move to another district and take what they gave me... or get my Extra (with my code speed then? Hah!) and stick it out until I could trade my call in for the next available 1x2. And that would have been a 25 year wait!

Times changed... the 25 year wait was eventually dropped, all Novice calls got switched to permanent calls, the "N" series 1x2's were reassigned to the Amateur Service, and in some districts, "A" series 2x2's were assigned to some Extras. Then came 1978, and with it, the imposition by the FCC of our current call sign assignment system, with new prefixes and call sign blocks, and the ability to keep your assigned call when you moved out of district. And in more recent times, the Vanity system came into being, and with it, the ability (within some limitations) to pick the call you want.

In all that time, my call never changed. It wasn't always easy... I've been called a bootlegger, a Novice out of band, and a lot of other things by US hams not familiar (pre-Vanity) with the old style call. I've had more contest, DX and DXpedition stations butcher my call than I care to recount (being in pileups with VE3VAW was REAL fun!). But I came to enjoy the rhythm of my call on CW, and as time went by, I got used to it.

But every now and then I wonder... has the time come to change it?

I've thought about it. I got my Tech in the same test session (St. Patrick's Day, 1978, State College PA) that generated some of the first amateur N3AAx 1x3 calls. When the WN3 2x1 calls were being issued, I thought of trying to time it to shorten my call, to WN3V or even WN3A or WN3W (but chickened out when I realized that there was no guarantee I'd be able to time it right); besides, I'm old fashioned, I really wanted a 1x2 if I was going to get anything. And when the Vanity calls were available, the initial cost (\$70 for 10 years) was more than I wanted to (or could) spend.

On the other hand, it has been a long time. And when a noted and respected ham like Martti OH2BH gently chides me about it being more than time to change to a "grown up" call (as he did a few years ago at Dayton), to say nothing of local hams like the former W3IBT, it does make me consider the matter again.

OK, so, what 1x2 to ask for? I'd want to stay a "3," just wouldn't feel right to have any out-of-district call; like I said, I'm old-fashioned (a "2?" I haven't lived in NNJ for a LONG time!). As far as I can tell, all of the short versions of my call (WN3V, A or W; N3VA, W3AW, N3AW, W3VA, and so on) are taken, have been for a long, long time. So are variations on my initials (ie N3RJ, W3RN, etc.)

Hmmm. What about a play on my old college club's call? They're still K3CR, and KC3R is a club station (with the same trustee as 'CR); W3CR and N3CR are taken. So are the variations on their old W3YA/W8YA and W8XE calls.

A 2x2? WN3VA? WV3AW? Nah, what would be the point of just dropping one letter? Not too many other combinations appeal to me.

A 1x3? Most "N" 1x3's are too relatively new, it would have to be a "K" or "W". Which one? W3VAW? Eh. N3VAW? A Tech out near Philly – wonder how many of my DX QSO's he gets cards for? K3VAW is still out in Westmoreland Co... haven't talked to her for awhile, hope she's still doing well! K / W3RJN? Too close to W3RJM, too confusing. And like a 2x1, just not really to my taste.

No, if I'm going to change, a 1x2 would be the way to go. Just don't see one currently available that I really like. You might say that all the "good" 1x2 calls are taken... and quite a few held by ops outs ide of the 3rd district, who never lived here and never will. Makes me understand what KH2D used to complain about, before he moved from Guam to Florida and became W4/KH2D...

Bottom line is, I'm just too used to the call. I just can't see changing it.

But I'll tell you what. I'll let you guys give me some advice. No, really. No promises – but take a look at the "3" district 1x2's currently available (at Vanity HQ out on the 'net), or coming available in the next few months, and let me know if you think any of them are a good fit. Has to have decent phonetics on phone and a good rhythm on CW. (W3VR? Hmmm. Wonder if Al & Mae would mind... but two "2's" have already put in for it...)

Find me a good call, and I might just finally listen to Martti, break down and change, after all these years.

Hey, at least I've now been licensed over 25... right?

German Experimental Stations on 440 kHz

Geri Holger, DK8KW/W1KW, in Peine near Hannover, reports that German telecommunication authorities have issued him an experimental license to operate on the "medium wave" frequency of 440 kHz using the call sign DI2BO. He joins Walter Staubach, DJ2LF, in Dormitz near Nuernberg, who's been operating experimental station DI2AG on 440 kHz. Tests have been under way on that frequency since January 2005, Holger says, "to study the special propagation conditions on medium w ave." Holger says CW beacon transmissions (which include call sign and grid square) will be sent on 440 kHz (±100 Hz), maximum 200 Hz bandwidth at a maximum power of 9 W ERP. "Both beacon transmissions will be coordinated in a way so that they can be observed simultaneously to study the propagation from both locations at the same time," Holger explained. "Also, two-way contacts between both experimental stations are planned." DI2BO is using a marine radio transmitter running about 130 W output into a top-loaded 18-meter umbrella antenna. He calculates the ERP is around 5 W. Further information is on the DK8KW Longwave Information Web site, http://www.qru.de/di2bo.html

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California PUC Approves BPL Regulations

NEWINGTON, CT, April 28th, 2006 — Saying that broadband over power line (BPL) will bring Internet access to "underserved communities," the California Public Utilities Commission (CPUC) has adopted regulatory guidelines for electric utilities and companies that wish to develop BPL projects in that state.

While the Commission's BPL guidelines include a requirement to maintain the safety and reliability of the electric distribution system, the state agency has no jurisdiction over radio frequency interference, which received no mention in the PUC's news release. ARRL Laboratory Manager Ed Hare, W1RFI, points out that the utility industry still must meet another tier of federal regulations that govern permitted BPL signal levels and interference issues.

"Although this action addresses how BPL operators will be responsible to state regulators, it does not address any of the technical problems with BPL in any way," Hare observed. "Utilities will still have to carefully choose BPL vendors with a proven track record of preventing interference complaints."

Benefits vs Uphill Battle

The CPUC said it wants to foster BPL deployment to solve the "last mile" problem of broadband delivery and to increase consumer choice in broadband providers. "BPL has the potential to bring broadband Internet services to communities who do not have broadband service available today from the telephone companies or cable companies," said CPUC President Michael R. Peevey. "BPL can also provide benefits to electric customers by enabling valuable 'smart grid' applications that could improve electric system reliability and support money-saving energy management technologies."

One commissioner suggested that BPL faces an uphill battle. "This is a nascent technology with technological, market, and financial hurdles before it," commented CPUC member John Bohn. "By removing unnecessary regulations from its path, we free BPL entrepreneurs to invest and take the risks they want, while protecting ratepayers from any downside."

Demonstrably Wrong

ARRL CEO David Sumner, K1ZZ, said that while the League's concern is with BPL interference and not with the viability of BPL in the broadband marketplace, "it's odd to see the California PUC echoing the pro-BPL rhetoric that was coming out of the FCC two years ago and that is so demonstrably wrong today." Sumner points out that BPL has been around for years now, and "after all the hype," the most-recent FCC statistics show no more than about 4000 BPL lines in service in the entire US. "The California PUC would better serve its citizens by focusing on more capable broadband technologies, such as fiber and wireless, that do not have the potential to disrupt radio communication," Sumner concluded.

Utility Commissioners' Task Force Expresses Reservations

The February 2006 National Association of Regulatory Utility Commissioners (NARUC) "Report of the Broadband over Power Lines Task Force" included reservations about the technology expressed by utilities themselves. "First Energy commented that it is still not clear that BPL technologies live up to their hype," the report noted. Con Edison said the technology still has credibility issues. "Don't tell me what it can do; show me what it can do," the report quotes the utility. PPL and Idacomm called a halt to their BPL activities in Pennsylvania, Nevada and Idaho. NARUC's year-earlier task force report pointed to the unclear regulatory climate for BPL and the costs of its deployment in rural areas as obstacles.

ARRL Staffer Testified on Early Policy Draft

In February 2005, ARRL staff member Dean Straw, N6BV, testified at a CPUC public hearing on an earlier CPUC draft on broadband deployment — including BPL. In his testimony, Straw --an electrical engineer and an ARRL technical editor — decried the fact that a section of the draft policy document dealing with BPL neglected to mention the technology's disadvantages.

He cited interference from BPL to radio receivers, interference to BPL from radio transmitters and a lack of bandwidth for expansion, especially in instances where BPL interference must be mitigated in some fashion.

"We are not opposed to Internet broadband services," Straw maintained on behalf of the Amateur Radio community at large. "We're not categorically opposed to Access BPL, but we are opposed categorically to interference." Straw urged caution against what he called "a wholesale embracing" of BPL on the part of the CPUC.

The policy the CPUC adopted April 27th stemmed from a draft developed by CPUC member Rachelle Chong, a former FCC commissioner.

CPUC's Goals

The CPUC said its action, among other things, would allow the flexibility of third parties or electric utility affiliates to invest in and operate BPL systems; require utilities to follow affiliate transaction rules for transactions between a utility and BPL affiliate to protect against cross subsidies and other anticompetitive concerns; require companies installing BPL equipment on utility infrastructure to pay pole attachment fees; align investor risks and rewards, including ratepayer/ shareholder sharing of any access fees exceeding the pole attachment fees; and exempt certain types of BPL-related transactions from regulatory review.

The Bands are Going to "Hell"

For the past six or seven years I've enjoyed the leisurely pace of Hellschreiber, a digital mode that prints across your computer screen a bit like a fax, which is why it is sometimes dubbed the "fuzzy mode".

Feld-Hell chugs along at 25 wpm, and some softw are allows you to print simple pictures like smiley faces and stars. Mostly you'll find US operators

There is a rich history to this mode, which was originally patented in 1929 by Rudolf Hell and used extensively in portable field operations during WWII. It eventually was employed by some news services and remained in use as recently as 1980. Unlike teleprinters, Hellschreiber machines had only two moving parts and so were mobile and dependable.

Today you don't need a Hellschreiber machine because of software by IZ8BLY, MultiPSK or the commercial MixW.

Until recently, Hellschreiber enthusiasts were sometimes frustrated by the low level of activity in the mode. Then in March a Feld-Hell club was formed which has stimulated new interest in the old fuzzy mode. Membership is free and there are some achievement awards, links to a cluster that spots digital stations, a club newsletter and a weekly 20-meter

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Pickled Ham Craig Sturman N7ZSD

There are things that will make a ham radio operator all wild-eyed and crazy. Kind of like poison ivy. A ham walking down the street in this condition will cause passers-by to take a wide berth and small children will hide behind the parents' coat tails. People will see the expression that has been permanently burned into a hams' face and think that he knows something that they don't. Like some hideous creature is behind them or aliens are attacking. I've been doing this a LONG time, and I've always found DXpedition logs to have issues with band/mode changes, etc, that are not correctly reflected in the log. This is one of the reasons that the complete data is not provided in the web log; it provides the QSL manager with some latitude to review the log based on QSLs received, and see if there are any problems that can be corrected before the QSLs are issued. I plan to NOT reply to each of your emails; I've received over 150 to date, and they all are relative to QSOs not being in the log, or incorrect band/mode.

You can trust that I will thoroughly examine each of your QSOs against the log, and do my best to ensure that you get credit for each QSO that match the log entries. I suspect many of the issues raised in the emails will be resolved. Note that there is always the possibility of a SLIM operator that will result in a not-in-log as well as some true not-in-logs. Remember, I've been doing this 20 plus years; I've seen most everything, and I'll do my level best to do my job with speed and integrity."— KU9C

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

Newington, CT, May 3rd, 2006 — Several FCC Part 97 Amateur Radio rule revisions to implement changes agreed to at the international level during World Radiocommunication Conference 2003 (WRC-03) now are in effect. The FCC

Order, released in January, affects §97.111, Authorized transmissions; §97.113, Prohibited transmissions; §97.115, Third party communications, and §97.117, International communications. The Federal Register published the changes May 3. The FCC has yet to deal with the so-called "Morse code proceeding," WT Docket 05-235, which also stemmed from decisions made at

WRC-03. The Commission has proposed deleting the Element 1 5 WPM code

test as a requirement to obtain any Amateur Radio license. "These amendments will ensure that the Commission's Amateur Radio Service rules conform to Article 25 of the international Radio Regulations adopted at the 2003 World Radiocommunication Conference, and will further the

Commission's ongoing efforts to streamline its Amateur Service Rules," the FCC Order said. "The overall effect of this action is to update the Part 97 Amateur Radio Service rules in the Code of Federal Regulations to conform to now-effective international agreements."

The FCC Order revises:

§97.111(a)(1) to permit "transmissions necessary to exchange messages with other stations in the Amateur Service, except those in any country whose administration has notified the ITU that it objects to such communications. The FCC will issue public notices of current arrangements for international communications." The old language permitted communication among amateur stations in different countries except those in any country whose administration has given notice that it objects to such communications."

The FCC said the change does not prejudice its consideration of comments to rule changes it's proposed to §97.111(a)(2) in WT Docket 04-140-the so-called "Omnibus" proceeding that covers a wide range of rule changes and proposals. The Commission has proposed amending that rule section to clarify that amateur stations may at all times and on all authorized channels transmit communications necessary to meet essential needs and to facilitate relief actions.

§97.115(a)(2) to facilitate the transmission of international communications on behalf of third parties in emergency or disaster-relief situations, whether or not a third-party agreement is in place between the US and the countries involved. The revision now permits communication with any non-US station "when transmitting emergency or disaster relief communications" as well as with any non-US station "whose administration has made arrangements with the United States to allow amateur stations to be used for transmitting international communications on behalf of third parties."

The revised rule further provides that no station may transmit third-party traffic other than emergency or disaster relief communications to a station whose government has not made a third-party arrangement. Still excepted from the prohibition is any third party eligible to be the control operator of an amateur station.

§97.113(a)(4) to prohibit amateur stations exchanging messages with amateur stations in other countries from making transmissions that are encoded for the purpose of obscuring their meaning, except for control signals exchanged between Earth command stations and space stations in the Amateur-Satellite service, something Part 97 already provides for. The old rule referred to the use of "codes and ciphers."

The same rule also already prohibits transmitting music, communications intended to facilitate a criminal act, obscene or indecent words or language and false or deceptive messages, signals or identification.

§97.117 to state that amateur stations may transmit communications incidental to the purposes of the Amateur Service and to remarks of a personal character.

The FCC also revised §97.3 and 97.309 to update the definition of International Morse code and of various digital codes in the amateur rules to reflect changes in the Radio Regulations.

According to the FCC, the WRC-03 Final Acts revised the international regulations that apply to the Amateur and the Amateur Satellite services and became effective July 5, 2003. These Part 97 revisions now bring the FCC's Amateur Service rules into conformance with the international Radio Regulations.
