

Report from CTARL (Chinese Taipei Amateur Radio League of Taiwan)

The China Fujian Province Amateur Radio club launched a hot air balloon to Senkaku/Diaoyu Islands on New Year's. They used APRS(Automatic Packet Reporting System) to support and monitoring the entire status during on flight.

Unfortunately the hot air balloon flight lost altitude from 10400 feet ,falling down to 2700 feet and then the radio signal disappeared due to wind wrong or fuel shortage, as the balloon crashed in Senkaku/Diaoyu Islands waters.

The Taiwan Coast Guard contacted the Japan Coast Guard for support during rescue & recovery efforts.

From 5 To 500 & Everywhere In Between Bill Hill W3WH

This probably seems like a strange title for an article, but what it means is from five Watts QRP to 500 Watts QRO, with other popular stops in between such as 100 Watts. I've been a ham a long time and have almost always used 100 Watts as my power level. A few years ago I did get interested in QRP and just this past year I got my first linear amplifier so now I have the ability to run as much as 500 Watts.

I never felt that I needed more than hundred Watts since I had little trouble attaining DXCC and Worked All States etc. That was before I got interested in 160 m.

On 160 having a little more oomph is definitely desirable. On the other hand you can do an awful lot with five Watts. A few years ago somebody either CQ are QST sponsored a contest that we and all year long and I answered as a QRP entry and finish the year with 123 DXCC entities in the log all at five Watts. Last month during the ARRL 10 Meter contest, I easily worked DX stations with five Watts including one in New Zealand.

I haven't had a lot of success yet on 160 with the exception I worked Australia and New Zealand couple times earlier this fall but I'm hoping for some fun during the winter season on top band. Where the amplifier has demonstrated its advantage is when trying to work DXpeditions such as the Wake Island and Lakwadsheep (VU7AG). Not that 500 Watts is necessary it just makes it easier.

For example there is a special event station on now celebrating the memory of Nelson Mandela it probably took me 15 or 20 minutes to work them because I was only running five Watts. If I'd been using 500 Watts it

probably would've taken one or two minutes but the point is that you can have a lot of fun with HF running anywhere from 5 to 500 or maybe 1500 Watts.

Get on the air and see what happens. You'll be pleasantly surprised.

Hello to all my friends at WASH! Just wanted to provide an update to the NØVLR household in Oregon.

Back in May, 2012 I started a job here in Corvallis, OR (home to Oregon State University). As some of you many recall that my PA commute was long and the "955" repeater got a lot of my attention (how could you forget?). Well things here are quite a bit different and my whole commute is all of about 5 minutes, as I live less than 2 miles from work.

I have gotten involved in the local repeater club, Peak Radio Association - check the website for the large coverage map and the 12 voting repeaters that make up the system (http://w7pra.org/), covering the WA/OR border to the OR/CA border from the coast to about 50 miles inland or so. My other radio club is ARES-focused (www.BCARES.org), and serves the local Sherriff for EMCOMM and support Search & Rescue(SAR) operations. Which led me to get certified as a SAR responder (http://www.co.benton.or.us/sheriff/ems/sar/academy.php). A word of advice, if you come out here: Don't get lost, I may be the one to come find you, and with Echo-Link, your radio friends might hear about it!

There are a couple of hamfests in the area - midway between WASH and WACOM-sized - with vendors, demonstrations, and presentations on lessons learned. The big one hamfest out here is SEAPAC http://www.seapac.org/ and it is held at the same time that I attend an annual conference in FL - so it will be a while before I can get to this one.

In other radio news....I completed the HVOB II (that's Highly Versatile Orange Box II, the NH edition) for my sister Diane KB1KRI, and her husband Brian KB1KRJ, and was hand-delivered in October at their wedding. And before you ask: No, we did NOT run a special event station there - however, there were a few hams on hand!

Other activities this year involved participating in my first simulated emergency test (SET) in November, running a 2M simplex contest, writing an article for QST (yet to be published though), going out on some real and mock SAR missions, buying a little 16' lake boat for the family to enjoy.

I continue to work at NuScale Power, helping design the next small modular reactor (SMR), now with additional help from the US Department of Energy funding.

Speaking of work, my work is on the HP campus here in town and they have an EMCOMM trailer that was semi-mothballed - I keep trying to resurrect that project - but to date, no luck. It needs a tower winch repair to be fully functional.

The family is doing fine with their new schools, jobs, and friends. The weather is typically milder



- although we just got an unusual snow storm this year and closed the schools for 5 days.

My Mobile Antenna

This is one of those "I hate to admit this but" stories.

Quite a few years ago, I had a Subaru. I drilled a hole in the roof and installed a dual band antenna with an NMO base on it. At the time our repeater was located in downtown Mount Lebanon, and the antenna worked kind of okay. It was never spectacular, but I attributed that to the fact that this antenna was only 12 inches high and is obviously not even close to a 5/8 wave on 2 meters, which is generally accepted to be the best solution for most applications. Anyway, it worked okay. After the Subaru was gone, that antenna went into storage never to see the light of day again until about a month ago.

Since I got a new Honda couple of years ago, I've been using a through the glass antenna that I formally had installed on my Mazda Miata. Once again, it was a little less than okay but I didn't want to drill holes in this new car.

I really expected that after our repeater was moved back to Mount Lebanon at St. Clair Hospital that I would get much improved performance, but that didn't happen. At the WACOM Hamfest I bought a NMO

lip-mount for the rear hatchback of my SUV, and installed my trusty old 12 inch high NMO antenna, pressed the push to talk button in my driveway — and nothing happened. I was not making the repeater. Nuts!

I started to do little research, since I decided I probably would should buy another antenna. In the midst of all this research, I read some reviews of the current antenna that I own. One of the reviews said that the antenna didn't work very well until I adjusted it to bring the SWR down. Then it worked well. This was a revelation to me, since it never occurred to me that you could adjust these mobile antennas for a better match. Well I looked at the antenna, and lo and behold, you can adjust the length of this antenna slightly (about a half an inch). I never knew the adjustment existed!

The other day I got out my MFJ analyzer, and sure enough, the SWR was off the scale! After some trial and error, I seem to have found the sweet spot and now having SWR on two meters of about 1.3:1, I can make the repeater consistently during my travels around Washington County. Voila!

The point of all this is that sometimes there are obvious things right in front of your nose that you completely miss, and in my case I missed it for years. The other point, of course, is that if you're getting less than acceptable results from your 2 m mobile antenna, try adjusting it with an analyzer to achieve a better match than you have now.

Yes it was kind of hard to admit that it never occurred to me to try adjusting the antenna, but I'm glad it finally did. YMMV!

Tokyo Hy-Power, a manufacturer of Amateur Radio amplifiers, antenna tuners, and other equipment, is in bankruptcy, and its plant, in Saitama Prefecture near Tokyo, has been shuttered. Telephones at the company no longer are being answered, and its Japanese website has been taken down, although the company's US website remains working. Company CEO/President Nobuki Wakabayashi, JA1DJW, founded Tokyo Hy-Power Labs in 1975. He blamed "the recent depression in the industrial RF power products area [which] has led to the very difficult financial position."

Tokyo Hy-Power's early products were HF antenna couplers, although within a couple of years it began manufacturing amplifiers for the Amateur Radio market, including solid-state mobile amplifiers. Among its early products was the HL-4000 linear amplifier, which the company claimed was "the first real HF band high-power linear of its kind in Japan." It has been manufacturing RF products for the industrial market since 1984.

The company also once marketed the HT-750, a portable, low-power SSB/CW transceiver for 40, 15, and 6 meters in a hand-held transceiver form factor. At Dayton Hamvention® 2013, the company displayed a prototype of the XT-751, an advanced model it hoped to develop, covering 40 through 6 meters and with an internal antenna tuner. Among its latest products were solid-state HF amplifiers, as well as amplifiers for 6 and 2 meters.

InnovAntennas has acquired the legendary Force 12 antenna company and product line and has moved the Force 12 factory from Bridgeport, Texas, to Grand Junction, Colorado, into a



facility shared with InnovAntennas America. The Grand Junction facility is up and running, manufacturing and shipping antennas. InnovAntennas says it plans to produce updated versions of classic Force 12 antennas as well as all-new models.

InnovAntennas Founder Justin Johnson GØKSC has been working with Force 12 on model improvements over the last few years and has now set about an entire product overhaul which will include the already completed C and XR series Multi-monoband Yagis. All existing product lines are safe in terms of the supply of parts and repairs.

Announcing the Fourteenth Annual WASH 2Meter Contest!

This January will mark the Fourteenth Annual *WASH* 2 Meter Contest. We've already had a lot of interest in it, and this year promises to be even more exciting!

Everyone who participated in it the last thirteen years had a blast, and we hope to continue the tradition again this year!

Please review this year's rules carefully. After evaluating feedback from participants the last two years, we made some changes and additions last year that we hope will really generate some interest! There may be some additional "tweaking" of the rules between now and January, so keep an eye on this column in the next few newsletters, and we'll look forward to seeing you on the 11th!

Date & Times: Saturday, January 11th, 2014 from 7 to 11 PM EST. (That's January 12th 0000-0400 UTC to the purists!)

Objectives:

- To make as many contacts as possible
- To have fun!

Band, Mode & Frequencies: The contest will take place solely on 2

- FM: FM simplex only, no repeater contacts. The FM frequencies are all standard 2 Meter simplex frequencies, as per the ARRL 2 Meter Band Plan, every 15 kHz, from 146.505 to 146.595 MHz, and 147.450 to 147.580 MHz. Use of simplex frequencies in the "FM Experimental Simplex" band of 145.510 to 145.670 are not recommended. See list of recommended simplex channels at the end of the rules.
- **CW**: 144.05 to 144.1 MHz Only. (See ARRL 2 Meter band plan)
- SSB & AM: 144.2 to 144.275 MHz Only. (See ARRL 2 Meter band plan).
- Digital (including RTTY): 144.51 to 144.55 MHz. (See ARRL 2 Meter band plan) Multiple digital modes may be used, and participants are free to use any generally accepted Digital mode, but only ONE Digital QSO with a given station regardless of mode
- → Note: Listen for CW QSO's around 144.1 MHZ 15 minutes after the hour
- → Listen for SSB & AM QSO's around 144.2 MHz 30 minutes after the hour
- → Listen for Digital QSO's around 144.51 MHZ 45 minutes after the hour

In the event of accidental QRM with nets and non-contest QSO's in progress, please respect their right to the frequency and QSY.

Power Limit: Maximum 100 watts output.

Exchange: Callsign, contact number, ZIP Code.

For the purposes of the contest, the 5 Digit ZIP Code for your location is sufficient — do not use the "Zip +4" code. Mobiles and portables should use the ZIP code of their location as determined to the best of their ability. Canadian stations will use their 6 digit postal code

Example 1: "N3ZCG from W8XK, please copy Number 3, 15347."

Example 2: "K3VX from K3CM, please copy Number 21, 16801"

Example 3: "W3WH from W3OC, please copy Number 7, 15137"

Contacts: Work as many different calls and locations as possible, giving Exchange as noted above. Work each station once per mode, and once per ZIP Code — Mobiles can be reworked whenever they change locations. Remember hilltops work best!

Disqualification: Remember, this is a friendly "for fun" contest. Stations may be disqualified for infractions of the rules and for unacceptable operating practices. While not an inclusive list, stations may be disqualified for:

- FM signals transmitted on simplex channels below 146.505 MHz.
- Intentional interference to non-contesters, nets, & QSO's
- Intentional interference to other contest operators
- The committee reserves the right to verify QSO's. QSO's that can not be verified may be removed from the log without penalty.

Scoring: Each Contact: Phone (FM, SSB, AM): 1 point

CW: 2 points Digital (any mode): 2 points

Multipliers: Locations (Number of different ZIP Codes)

Power: Stations running 10 watts output or less: 3

Stations running over 10 up to 30 watts output: 2

Stations running over 30 watts output: 1

Final Score: Total Points x Locations x Power

After the Contest: Fill out all the log information. In the upper left corner check whether "base" or "mobile." In the upper right corner be sure to enter your callsign and club affiliation (or "none" if not a member of any club). Please number all log sheets consecutively. Log sheets can be downloaded from the *WASH* web site, www.n3sh.org, no later than January 1st.

Submit Log Sheets:: Check your log sheets carefully for dupes. Verify that all information is entered.

Each log submitted on or before the deadline will receive one (1) main prize ticket to *WASH*Fest 2014 on February 23rd

Logs submitted with an SASE will have their ticket mailed to them, otherwise, the tickets will be available at the **WASH** Club table

Recommended FM Simplex Frequencies:

After the first year of the contest, we found that the limited number of frequencies suggested in the rules were insufficient for the activity level. In subsequent years, we permitted use of any recognized simplex frequency, as per the ARRL recommended guidelines published in the annual ARRL Repeater Directory and other sources, above 146.520 MHz.

You will note that many of these frequencies are listed as potential dual use, with a "local option" for them to be used for repeater inputs and outputs.

After discussions with Frank Bobro N3FB, Repeater Coordinator for the Western Pennsylvania Repeater Council (WPRC), we have determined that the following simplex frequencies are recommended for use. Use of those that are "dual use" are not expected to cause issues for any known repeaters.

Remember that good amateur practice indicates that should a contest participant be notified that they are inadvertently causing interference to a coordinated repeater that is using a recognized simplex channel, they should immediately cease use of that frequency in favor of, and out of respect for, the existing repeater.

The following list of recommended frequencies are recognized as standard simplex channels and should not suffer from co-channel problems with any existing repeaters:

146.505 MHz	146.580 MHz	147.510 MHz
146.520 MHz (*)	147.450 MHz	147.525 MHz
146.535 MHz	147.465 MHz	147.540 MHz
146.550 MHz	147.480 MHz	147.555 MHz
146 565 MHz	147 495 MHz	147 570 MHz

Simplex channels below 146.505 MHz are not to be used, as many of these are in use in WPa as repeater input frequencies.

(*) The National Simplex Frequency, 146.520 MHz, may be used. However, many stations use 52 for casual conversation or as a calling frequency. If the frequency is in use or becomes used by non-participants, please permit them to use the frequency unimpeded.

To avoid interference to other contestants and other users of the bands, please do not operate on 5 or 10 kHz "offsets" from these recognized FM channels.

Bottom line: Enjoy the contest, but do so responsibly.



Newington, CT, January 4th, 2014 — The ARRL-sponsored medium-frequency experiment, operating as WD2XSH, continues apace in an effort to demonstrate the viability of 472 to 479 kHz as a secondary Amateur Radio allocation.

At the same time, the FCC has been silent regarding the ARRL's November 2012 <u>Petition for Rulemaking</u> that asked the Commission to make this segment of the spectrum available to radio amateurs in the US. Delegates to the 2012 World Radiocommunication Conference approved a 7 kHz-wide secondary allocation between 472 and 479 kHz for the Amateur Radio Service, with a power limit of 5 W EIRP (or 1 W EIRP, depending on location). The FCC has indicated that it will address the issue within the context of its Notice of Proposed Rule Making in ET Docket No. 12-338, to formally reflect the Final Acts of WRC 2007 in its rules.

In his quarterly WD2XSH update, Experiment Coordinator Fritz Raab W1FR, reported that 514 contacts — 10 in the last quarter — have been logged among those taking part in the experiment across the US.

"As usual, activity increased as conditions improved during the fall. Much of the recent activity has involved WSPR-15," Raab reported. "Reception over significant distances (eg, Europe, Alaska) has been reported. Much of the activity is being undertaken by a few new experimental licensees." Raab noted that WD2XSH participant Brian Justin WA1ZMS, transmitted Fessenden commemorative broadcasts on AM via his own experimental license, WG2XFQ, during the December holidays.

In the US, the 472-479 kHz band is part of the larger 435-495 kHz segment that is allocated on a primary basis to the Maritime Mobile Service (federal and nonfederal users), and on a secondary basis for federal government aeronautical radionavigation. The ARRL stated in its Petition that it is unaware of any domestic assignments that might conflict with the allocation of 472 to 479 kHz to the Amateur Radio Service, and there is almost no power line carrier (PLC) operation in this band segment. The FCC in 2003 cited the potential for interference to utility-operated PLC systems when it turned down an ARRL petition seeking an LF "sliver band" at 135.7 to 137.8 kHz.

The WD2XSH experiment involves more than three dozen stations and includes all geographic areas of the US, including Alaska and Hawaii. Most of the stations are in the eastern half of the US. Raab has reported no interference issues during the WD2XSH experiment, begun in 2006 and initially using spectrum in the vicinity of 500 kHz.

The experiment is scheduled to continue until the current license expires on August 1st, 2015. Seventeen US experimental stations not affiliated with the ARRL experiment and a handful of Part 15 stations are active in the vicinity of 500 kHz. A dozen so-called "heritage stations" in the US operate there as well.

As Raab noted in his report, at least a dozen countries already have approved Amateur Radio operation in the 630 meter band — 472 to 479 kHz. They are Germany, Greece, Malta, Monaco, Norway, the Philippines, Czech Republic, New Zealand, Australia, Switzerland, Finland, Spain, and France.

2014 Rail Trip to ARRL Headquarters in Newington CT — March 6th —8th,2014

Departure will be on the AMTRAK #42 The Pennsylvanian from Pittsburgh at 7:30 AM on Thursday, March 6th. The train can also be boarded at Greensburg, it's next stop. On arrival in Philadelphia, we will transfer to the #143 Northeast Regional to head North to CT. It is recommended that you arrive to the AMTRAK station early to avoid any unexpected problems. Arrival in Meridan, CT will take place Thursday night. Trip guests will stay at the 4 Points By Sheraton hotel in Meridan, CT. The hotel will pick everyone up at the station (it may take more than one trip). Rental cars will take us to ARRL Headquarters in Newington, and we will operate from W1AW, on Friday, March 7th. Everyone will head out for dinner together Friday night, and return home first thing Saturday morning.

Bob says that "the AMTRAK trains are very roomy, comfortable, quiet and smooth. There is lots of legroom, the seats recline and footrests come up. There are 110 volt outlets at every seat so you can plug in your computer or whatever, free WiFi and enjoy the ride. (Amtrak advises that you bring headphones for any radios.) There will be a dining or snack car on the train. The food is ok and while the price might be a little high, it's not too bad. You CAN bring your own food and drink. The train going up the coast has a little less room, but will still be good. (Bring your scanner and listen to the train traffic!)"
