Committee reports:

VE (W3WN): Next VE Session at WPXI on July 16th. Thanks to N3FB for making the arrangements. VE's needed for the next session. No preregisters yet, but some interest from potential new hams.

Repeaters (N3FB/KB3IAC):



WASH Field Day 2015 Stats

Rick Bell KB3IAC, Co-Field Day Chair Here are some statistics from Field Day 2015:



- (2)We used 4 Bands
- We used 3 Modes (3)
- N3SH used 3 stations: 2 SSB Phone & 1 Digital (4) (3A)
- (5) K3VX used 1 CW QRP Station
- (6) We rotated two digital stations from KE7FD & KB3DCO
- (7) No sunshine - No Solar Power
- We did operate all transceivers on battery power (8) (2,800 amps/35,280 Watts available)
- (9) Lighting and computational power supplied via gasoline fueled generator
- (10) We mobilized on-site at 9:00 AM (In the driving rain)
- (11) We were fully operational by Noon of Saturday (Still raining)
- (12) We had a full 24 hours of operation 2 PM Saturday until 2 PM Sunday on SSB Phone (Rained most of the time)
- (13) As we left the site at 3:30 PM on Sunday the sun came out Wouldn't have it any other way

It was hard to pinpoint the number of operators – not everyone reset the operator/initials parameter when they operated. It looks like between 12 – 16 operators.

This chart (above right) illustrates the breakdown on contacts.

As you can see 40 meters appears to be the bread & butter band this year. Although there was a lot of activity on 20 meters, we were antenna poor on 20. We should strive to have multiple 20m & 40m antennas - a pair for each mode for next year.

Overall, it was a very successful Field Day in spite of the weather.

WASH Field Day 2015 BIII HIII W3WH

Right after Field Day every year, I always realize that the year is half over.

Like the rest of the year, Field Day flew by and before I knew it it was finished. The whole package came together once again because of a great deal of time and effort invested prior to arriving at Woodland Crest in South Park. Of course, Rick and Jan Bell invest a huge amount of time and effort and expertise in preparing food for us to eat, as well as making sure we have all the little things that we need to make our operation successful, and some big things like batteries.

Larry Comden and I spent a fair amount of time earlier this year looking for acceptable sites, once we realized that the Outlook Grove would not be available to us. We all liked Outlook last year and many are still disappointed that we were not able to be there. Maybe next year?

Speaking of next year there is an offer on the table for us to operate on the campus of St. Clair Hospital. This is an intriguing possibility, and if it works out it will be a wonderful step forward in cementing our relationship with St. Clair Hospital — which, of course, is the home of our repeater. Time will tell if this will work out.

The biggest problem that we have every year is interference among the stations. We did our best to minimize this situation, but even by putting three dipole antennas in a line, which seems to help, interference was not eliminated. On Saturday afternoon, we directed a second fan dipole owned by Glenn KE7FD across the road from our shelter, and not only did it seem to work well, but it was far enough away to minimize interference. In total we had six antennas for four stations. Rick Bell mentioned that we were antenna poor for 20 meters, but we did have three antennas that potentially could have operated well on 20. I don't

Once again this year, the CW portion of our effort was worked with five Watts QRP. The low-power doesn't seem to prevent us from working anyone we can hear, even though we may have to wait in line if one of our louder others is calling the same station at the same time. We ended up with about 350 contacts on CW, which I think was just a few more than we managed last year. This year we intended to use two CW stations, but due to a shortage of operators at the last minute, we changed from two CW stations down to one — and it probably turned out to be a good thing. We used a Ten Tec 555 Scout transceiver, which has been around for at least 25 years, and is a very simple bare-bones unit, but it performed admirably.


This year the phone/digital effort consisted of two single sideband stations and a digital station. To my recollection both efforts had more contacts than last year, especially the digital, which I think how about twice as many as last year. Way to go digital guys!

The food served by chefs Rick and Jan Bell was for all of us, I think, the highlight of the weekend, and really made the miserable weather a minor issue in everyone's mind. The ribs served for Saturday evenings meal were to say the least scrumptious and enjoyed by all who signed up for them.

We had fewer visitors this year than last, but certainly we can blame that on the weather. All of us that were there for the duration or for a large part of the weekend thoroughly enjoyed ourselves as far as I know, and as I understand Jim Sanford to say if we can have food like this, let's have Field Day once a month! Field Day once a month is an interesting thought but it would probably get old very quickly.

All in all, it was a privilege and a pleasure to participate once again with the WASH Club, and thanks to all who helped make it a success.

o Carl, are we 2B or not 2B? That is the question I need to know." Quinn asked as he was setting up the logging software." "No, that would be 2B." Carl replied messing with Quinn.

"Wait.. What? Huh? Oh..."

"And WPA. And don't forget to put your initials in there too. Remember what happened last time. " Carl said reminding Quinn about the time everything was logged to operator "SSB", even the CW contacts which required a heavy dose of editing of the log file before it was sent to the ARRL.

"Quinn, we have the rest of the week to get things sorted out, and it's only Monday now... HEY! It's almost time for the net to start, turn your rig on." barked Carl tossing the Field Day packet aside.

Every Monday evening Carl and Quinn made sure they were on the air for the start time of 9 p.m. on 28.380 MHz for the Beam Shooters Net. Even if it meant giving up watching Monday Night Football or even more daring, slipping away from Dancing With The Stars, something both of their wives were addicted to. It might seem odd to some how both guys biological-body bathroom clocks were so regular week after week. However, Quinn almost bought the farm one week when upon his return (after checking into the net) to the couch where his wife sat glued to the star-studded gala, and he said, "I just love watching Dancing with Wolves with you hon". Because the forecast called for the possibility of rain, the boys took no chances and brought extra weather balloons, figuring if the rain did fall, the extra lift from the additional balloons would counteract the weight of the rain adhering to the balloons.

Upon reaching the farm field, and blocking the wheels, Quinn set out the helium tanks while Carl carefully laid out two balloons, keeping two more balloons in reserve in case they needed replacements. However, when he opened the shipping boxes the balloons came in (for until now neither of the guys had bothered to inspect the balloons) a packing slip in the first of four boxes stated that the balloons they had ordered were out of stock and in their place stronger, larger balloons were sent at no additional cost. Both of the guys thought this was a win-win and would allow them to add their spare antenna, a rotatable tri-band dipole left over from a discarded yagi driven element. The rain seemed to be picking up so they both reasoned that if it's worth doing at all, it's worth overdoing and pulled out all four balloons connecting the tethers to a hook to which the long-wire antenna would later hung. They reasoned they would just lower the wire antenna when they decided to try the rotatable dipole. It took both of them the better part of an hour to lay out the other two balloons, connect the quick release helium tank valves, followed by the support line which Quinn tied off to the rear bumper of the RV. The balloons began to float a little bit as the helium hissed into the unfolding balloons.

The long insulated antenna wire was heavier than they thought remembered it being or perhaps it was the wet grass that tugged at the wire, but in either case it took both of them to drag the long wire out the length of 6 football fields. Many minutes later after dealing with some obstacles in a gully before emerging on the other side, they looked back and noticed the RV was gone. It only took a few seconds for Carl to spot the RV hanging by its rear bumper at the end of the support line that was attached to the now fully expanded weather balloons, floating away skimming the tree tops pushed along by the strong winds that were now picking up in the Cranberry area. Out of shape, neither of them was able to catch up to the now fast moving airborne RV as it headed towards a neighborhood.

Local news stations reported what was thought to be the touchdown of an EFØ tornado that knocked over trees in the Cranberry area. What could not be explained was the chrome bumper embedded deeply in the top of one trees bearing a license plate that simply read:

"When all else fails... Amateur Radio"

Pattern of Contact Padding Prompts Disqualification, CQ Review of Past Contest Logs

The CQ World Wide Contest Committee <u>said in June</u> that it plans to review all past contest logs, after its investigation revealed a pattern of routine QSO padding on the part of one top-scoring CQ World Wide Contest operator. This follows in <u>the wake of the disqualifications</u> of some two dozen 2014 CQ WW SSB contest operators in April, and another 30 contestants in the 2014 CQ WW CW event. Among the latter group of DQs was the TO7A entry of Dmitry V. Stashuk, UT5UGR, of Kiev, Ukraine, for unclaimed use of assistance. TO7A had claimed the top Single-Operator, High Power score.

"During the public discussion around this disqualification, a section of the log on 160 meters was pointed out as being suspicious," the committee said. "Further checking revealed a run of 47 QSOs that were added to the log when TO7A could not be detected on the air by RBN [Reverse Beacon Network] or SDR recordings. In total, as many as 123 QSOs representing 22 additional multipliers were padded into the log." The CQ WW Contest Committee said the "particular pattern" of the suspicious contacts made it clear that they were added deliberately after the contest to fill in rest or break periods.

"Radiosport competition is built on a simple foundation — the expectation that all contacts are made over the air and correctly logged," the committee said. "Since operations are performed from the privacy of our stations and without supervision, we all trust that everyone is playing by the same rules."

The contest committee subsequently decided to dig more deeply into past contest logs submitted by UT5UGR, many of them competitive entries, including one for a record continental score, and it uncovered evidence of log padding going back to 2008, when UT5UGR placed third in the world in the Single-Operator, High Power category from V31WA in the CQ WW CW.

As a result, *CQ* has disqualified UT5UGR's entries in which they detected log padding and removed them from the official score database. In addition, any entry into a *CQ*-sponsored contest until July 2020 in which UT5UGR is the operator or listed as a participant will be reclassified as a check log.

UT5UGR's entries as TO7A into the 2009 and 2010 in the CQ WW SSB, and his 2011 and 2014 CQ WW 160 Meter Contest SSB entries under his own call sign have been disqualified. In addition to his 2008 V31WA CQ WW SSB entry from 2008, CQ also disallowed UT5UGR's TO7A 2014 CQ WW SSB and CW entries, as well as his TO7A entries in the CQ WW CW events in 2011, 2012, and 2013.

"This violation of the trust that underlies radiosport competition cannot be ignored," CQ said. The CQ WW Contest Committee has announced that new log checking processes are being developed to improve the detection of log padding. "We intend to test these methods against all submitted logs from 2011-2014. If other entries are found to have added unverifiable QSOs, we will address them on a case by case basis," CQ said.

"The CQ World Wide Contest Committee is committed to protecting the integrity of the competition as best as we can," the CQ post said, adding that it hoped the contesting community would do the same

A well-known voice in the Amateur Radio news media has gone silent.

Bill Pasternak WA6ITF, of Santa Clarita, California, died June 11th following a period of ill health. He was 73. Pasternak was co-founder (with Jim Hendershot WA6VQP) of *Amateur Radio Newsline™* (formerly *The Westlink Report*) ham radio news webcast and a frequent presence at Amateur Radio conventions.

Pasternak served as *Newsline*'s managing editor and occasional newscaster for the program. Even while hospitalized earlier this year, he kept his ear to the ground for news from the Amateur Radio community, so he could pass it along to those who had taken over *Newsline* during his illness — discovered after he broke two ribs in a fall.

Pasternak was the spark plug behind the all-volunteer *Amateur Radio Newsline* bulletin — which was relayed on repeaters around the US and elsewhere — as well as the creator and administrator of the annual YHOTY. He was the author of three books and served as a writer/producer on several educational films and videos, including the award-winning "Amateur Radio Today." In earlier years, he wrote the "Looking West" column for *73 Amateur Radio Today Magazine* for 26 years and penned a "VHF, FM and Repeater" column for *WorldRadio*. He also contributed to broadcast trade publications as well as to *CQ*.

In addition to the ARRL, Pasternak belonged to the Radio Club of America and the Quarter Century Wireless Association.

FCC News

Newington, CT, June 12 th, 2015 — Leaders of the US House Energy and Commerce Committee have reached agreement with FCC Chairman Tom Wheeler to amend the Commission's plans — announced in March — to close FCC field offices. Under the revised plan, the FCC will keep 15 of its 24 field offices open. The plan would "ensure better rapid response capabilities for the West, provide a mechanism for escalating interference complaints, improve enforcement of the FCC's rules against pirate radio operators, and prevent the Commission from transferring field office jobs to FCC Headquarters," a Committee media release said. The FCC has been under pressure from lawmakers and others to step back from the its plan to close two-thirds of its field offices.

"We found a good solution that makes sense. These changes will keep field offices open in strategic locations and help ensure that the commission can fulfill its responsibilities to the public and public safety communities," said Communications and Technology Subcommittee Chairman Greg Walden, W7EQI. "This agreement strikes a balance between the important work of FCC field agents and streamlining field operations to ensure the efficient use of taxpayer dollars. Positive outcomes often result from collaborative work. This agreement represents just such an effort."

As a result of the announced agreement a June 11 hearing of Walden's subcommittee to address the proposed closings was cancelled. ARRL General Counsel Chris Imlay, W3KD, was among those prepared to testify at the session

The closure plans were revealed earlier this year via an apparently leaked internal FCC Enforcement Bureau (EB) memorandum that indicated Bureau planned to ask the full Commission to cut two-thirds of its field offices and eliminate nearly one-half of its field agents. At the same time, the Bureau would develop a so-called "Tiger Team" of field agents as a flexible strike force it could deploy as needed.

After the League learned of the field office closure plans, ARRL CEO David Sumner, K1ZZ, expressed dismay at the proposals, coming "at a time when the Field staff is facing ever-increasing challenges." Sumner also had expressed concern "that there is already no sense of urgency in the FCC's enforcement activities targeting spectrum polluters, such as utilities with noisy power lines, or the few violators in our own ranks." The League has been working behind the scenes at the FCC and on Capitol Hill to make a case that more enforcement leads to better compliance in all services.

Under the proposals, initiated last fall, the field office geographic footprint would have been reduced from 24 sites to 8 sites, with the EB set to "pre-position" equipment in several other strategic locations. Offices already slated to remain open are New York City; Columbia, Maryland — the site of the Bureau's HF Direction-Finding Center; Chicago; Atlanta; Miami; Dallas; Los Angeles, and San Francisco. The other offices the FCC plans to keep open were not announced.

"Communities across America will continue to be served, even as the Commission becomes more efficient — it's a win-win," said House Energy and Commerce Committee Chair Fred Upton of Michigan. "It also demonstrates how much we can accomplish when we work together to tackle the many tough issues we face."

Edson PY2SDR requests fellow amateur satellite operators listen for a downlink signal from NanosatC-Br 1, the first Brazilian CubeSat. NanosatC-BR1 was launched on a Dnepr rocket from Dombarovsky in 2014.

The 1U CubeSat carries an ISIS U/V transceiver with 1200 bps FM AX.25 UHF command uplink and a 9600 bps BPSK downlink on 145.865 MHz.

NanosatC-BR1, is experiencing battery issues for the last several months and it now seldom emits a beacon in CW. For some time, Paulo PV8DX, was able to detect a beacon signal when the satellite was over the Caribbean sea during daylight. But now, no more signals have been detected.

Edson would like to request assistance from hams in the northern hemisphere to see if NanosatC-BR1 is still transmitting any signals. Any help will be much appreciated.

At that precise moment... CQ field day, CQ field day,... This is WA4ECY blasted out thru the organ speakers !!! We got off with a verbal reprimand,...

After all was said & done,... in retrospect, it was sooo funny. That's my story, & I'm stickin' to it.

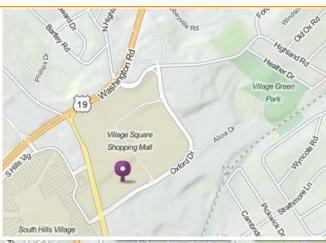

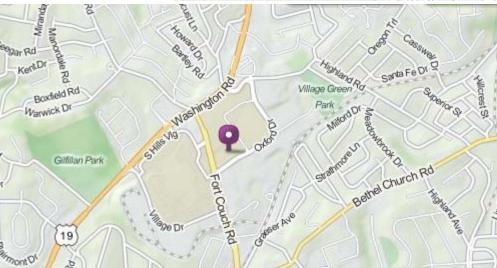
